Trachoma Screening

Trachoma screening will be carried out at Warlawurru School on **Monday September 3rd**. The World Health Organisation has adopted a resolution to eliminate blinding trachoma by the year 2020.

Trachoma is one of the world's leading causes of blindness and is caused by a bacterial infection. It was once endemic throughout Australia, but has largely disappeared, due to improved hygiene and sanitation. However, in some communities in the Kimberley, trachoma is still endemic.

Trachoma is an infectious eye disease and spreads from direct contact, where children are playing closely together, sharing towels, eye seeking flies (small black bush flies), and dirty faces (crusted mucous)

The Kimberley Population Health Unit has been running a Trachoma Control Program annually to coincide with the rest of the State. As part of this program, **school children aged 5 - 9 years** have been targeted for Screening and Treatment. The screening is done by the nurses checking under the upper eye lids of each child.
